Now I suppose there are still a few of those reading this article that are thinking to themselves, "Yea, that's all well and good, but it still doesn't help me in the



One of our families had this organ at home and brought it in since ‘electric pianos’ weren’t out yet! My major instrument was piano and everyone knew I played piano. This little gem did not have ‘foot pedals’ like a regular organ does. Instead, it had two ‘pump pedals’ that alternating feet ‘pumped’ to

push air through it to produce sound. The regular organist just happened to leave town that weekend and since I had been playing piano since I was 2 (My mother said!–by ear of course–lessons started when I was 6!)–they asked if I would play. I didn’t get a chance to practice on it till earlier that morning in the park. It had ‘pull pistons’ to change the sounds. So it was time to begin service. I pumped away awkwardly and unsteady so the sound that came out was pretty awful! That didn’t stop them from singing the hymns with the gusto of my “Old German Church”!

They all came up and thanked me, said I did a fine job. Didn’t say a word about the awful sound due to my uneven

‘pumping’. I was eshausted! When I got home, Mom said she was proud of me. Dad was working at our family restaurant but told me later he had heard about it. God was watching me. I just know it! I thank Him for this gift of music everyday and am very thankful for all the forgiveness for what I thought was an awful sound but in my heart was a joyful noise to the Lord!

So in closing of this first ‘memories and beyond’, remember God gave us music to praise Him ...so feel confidant in raising your voice with joy!

'BOLDLY APPROACHING THE THRONE OF GRACE'

The faithful beseech their Lord in the Prayer of the Church and in the Lord's Prayer

It happens each time our Lord gathers His people and serves them with His life-giving Word and His Gospel sacraments. As we receive Him and His good gifts, our faith is emboldened, and together we call upon our merciful God. We boldly approach His throne of grace to petition and to extol Him, saying the Prayer of the Church and praying the Lord's Prayer.

THE GIFT OF PRAYER

Corporate prayer has always been a mark of the public worship of the holy and blessed Trinity. According to Gen. 4:26, "men began to call on the name of the Lord" not long after the creation of the world. For centuries before Christ, the tribes of Israel went to the Lord's "house of prayer" in Jerusalem to thank and praise Him (Ps. 122:4). St. Luke informs us that in the days of the New Testament, as the early Christians devoted themselves steadfastly to the apostles' teaching, to the fellowship and to the breaking of bread, they also persevered in prayers (Acts 2:42).

Set within the Divine Service, the public prayers of God's holy people are properly viewed as the Spirit-empowered response flowing from Spirit-engendered faith that received Christ and His salvation. One contemporary theologian puts it this way. The prayers offered by the Church during worship are part of her "respiration," what she "exhales" in the power of the Spirit after having first deeply "inhaled" of the Spirit's life-giving breath.

The blessed and glorious privilege that is granted God's children to bring our concerns before Him is exactly that—a privilege. It is not something we've merited. Neither is it an inherent right. Rather, it is totally a gift of divine grace earned by our Lord Jesus Christ. Through His perfect life, sacrificial death and victorious resurrection, the incarnate Son of God has removed the barrier of sin

between us and God and gained for us "access to the Father by one Spirit" (Eph. 2:18). In the waters of Holy Baptism, this sacred privilege is conferred upon us. In the Divine Service it is exercised corporately by the communion of saints.

LINKING WORD AND SACRAMENT

Whether it's titled the Prayer of the Church or simply the Prayers matters little. As the invitation is reverently extended, "Let us pray for the whole people of God in Christ Jesus and for all people according to their needs", silence settles upon the worshipers and the Church approaches her Lord.

The common practice in Christendom is to position the Prayers between the Service of the Word and the Service of Holy Communion.

The juncture at which the Prayers are said also reminds us of the "rhythm of our worship." Our sacrifice of praise and our petitions to the Lord are offered in view of His tender mercies proclaimed and bestowed upon us in the reading of His Scriptures and in the preaching of His Gospel.

To understand and affirm the connection between the sacramental (God's giving to us, which is always primary) and the sacrificial (our giving back to God, which is secondary) is crucial if the theology and practice of Christian worship is to be Christ-centered and Gospel-oriented. In saying the Prayers, the congregated members of Christ's body carry out their God-given status as a royal priesthood of believers. They glorify the Lord and intercede before Him, serving Him and their neighbors.

Through the ongoing meditation of Jesus Christ, our great high priest, we rightly adore and thank our heavenly Father for all His benefits. Likewise, in union with Christ's intercessions, we implore our God on behalf of the Church and the

world, our own parish and local community, asking in accord with the apostle's directive (1 Tim. 2:1) that all people and circumstances may be brought under the Lord's Word.

That these requests are humbly yet confidently offered to the Lord is confirmed by the manner in which they are concluded: "Into your hands, O Lord, we commend all for whom we pray, trusting in your mercy; through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord".

Our certainty is based upon the sure promises of our Savior: "If two of you on earth agree about anything you ask for, it will be done for you by my Father in heaven" (Matt. 18:19), and "Whatever you ask for in prayer, believe that you have received it and it will be yours" (Mark 11:24).

THE WORDS CHRIST GAVE US

Along with the Prayers, we further entreat our heavenly Father and request His mercy and aid in the words that His only-begotten Son has given us—the Lord's Prayer.

Early in her history, the Church incorporated the Lord's Prayer in the order of the Divine Service as an integral element. She did this because of the importance and supreme value of the "Our Father." "Since our Lord is the author of this prayer," Martin Luther wrote, "it is without a doubt the most sublime, the loftiest and the most excellent...For every absolution, all needs, all blessings and all men's requirements for body and soul, for life here and beyond, are abundantly contained in that prayer."

It was Christ Himself who took the initiative in His Sermon on the Mount and put into our mouths the very words we are to say. "This then, is how you should pray: 'Our Father in heaven...'" (Matt. 6:9).

Responding to the request to be taught to pray, the Lord instructed his disciple accordingly. "When you pray, say: 'Father, hallowed be your

name..." (Luke 11:2).

In obedience to our Lord, therefore, as the fruit and exercise of faith in Him and His saving Gospel, we pray the very words that He graciously has given us. Led by His Spirit, we unite with our Christian brothers and sisters in the congregation and with the Church across the world and throughout the ages. We present the

seven divine petitions to our heavenly Father "as dear children ask their dear father," concluding with the word of sure and certain faith, "Amen, Amen... it shall be so".

Traditionally, the Lord's Prayer and the Words of Institution are closely bound in the Service of the Sacrament. In praying the Lord's Prayer in connection with the Eucharist, we

humbly request our heavenly Father to sanctify and consecrate us as we eat Christ's body and drink His blood, that in true faith we may receive all the benefits of this heavenly meal and rejoice in the foretaste it gives us of the feast to come.

Strengthening Our Spiritual Gifts
for The Great Commission

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit distributes them. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God at work. - 1 Corinthians 12:4-6 NIV

As we ring in the new year, staff will begin training with "Momentum a network for church revitalization." The Momentum Network is an initiative of the Institute of Lutheran Theology (ILT), with partnership from Church Doctor Ministries (CDM) through its Church4Today initiative. ILT brings academic depth, training, and resources to equip leaders. CDM brings decades of practical coaching, consulting, and revitalization experience. Together, ILT and CDM combine theological depth and real-world expertise to help churches not only learn but implement change.

Faith Lutheran Church has been accepted to the 12 Church Cohort. This means that we'll receive training, coaching, have access to tools, resource library and part of a network - free of charge. Momentum has already funded this network for the 12 churches. If you'd like to check out their website to give you more information visit: www.momentumnetwork.church. Momentum's seven objectives for churchs are:

1. Face the Facts With Faith – Assess health, leadership, and mission with clear data.
2. Build Sustainable Outreach – Equip churches to engage communities in Gospel-centered and culturally relevant ways.
3. Renew Congregational Life – Revitalize worship, leadership, and spiritual life.
4. Multiply Disciples and Leaders – Train everyday believers to lead and raise up new pastors and planters.
5. Foster a Thriving Network – Link congregations for encouragement, resource sharing, and collaboration.
6. Ignite Entrepreneurial Mission – Release creativity and innovation for new ministries, outreach, and community impact.
7. Measure and Share Impact – Track progress, celebrate wins, and tell stories of transformation.

We have a lot of strengths here at Faith. Momentum will come alongside us to help us grow stronger, reach our neighbors, and multiply disciples to shape our communities for Christ. If you're interested in learning more contact Pastor Alsen Wenzel, Colleen Palmer or the church office.
