# From Pastor's Heart Concerning Christian Giving

The Finance Committee, a few months back, asked if I would say something regarding Christian Giving. At the time I was thinking that they were asking me to do a Stewardship sermon series or Stewardship program but that wasn't the case. The Finance Committee decided and has sent out your giving statements as of the end of September and I was asked to write a letter to go with it. which I did. In that letter I asked that you please read this article on Christian Giving because as your Senior Pastor, I am very concerned about the financial aspects of our church. Therefore, I would like to point out some things about giving.

Our time on earth, our abilities as human beings, the income that comes to us through using our time and abilities well, the spiritual gifts the Spirit gives us, all are gifts from God and all are to be used to His glory when we really want to have God be our God. Jesus says interest follows investment; the heart's involvement is stimulated by serious investment

in the kingdom of God.

A practical expression of this is our Christian Giving. Offerings given in worship were part of the Covenant of Grace and Blessing from the beginning – a regular acknowledgment of God as God. As the history of the patriarchs unfolds in Genesis, the phrase "he built an altar to the Lord" described the development of regular worship practice – with sacrificial offerings being an integral part of it.

At Sinai, the Lord codified the Covenant for his people in the

Ceremonial Law. It prescribed many kinds of offerings to be brought by the people, including the tithe of field and flock. Through them the Lord mediated his grace to them.

In the New Testament, generous giving of some of our money to the Lord and to the needy is prescribed as a means of worshiping God, an antidote to the temptations of materialism, which we find in Matthew 6:19-33 and 1 Timothy 6:17-19. Therefore, interest follows investment; the heart follows the serious gift.

Christian Giving serves two purposes: 1. Allows Christians who want God to be their God to worship him in willing love by bringing offerings with grateful hearts. It is an expression of willing and dedicated agape-love. This purpose says that it is not God who needs our offering; it is we who need to give it – and want to give it. 2. Our giving contributes to the support of the mission and ministry of the church.

Effective Christian Giving also requires two steps: 1. A conscious, willing decision to honor Jesus and contribute to the church's work with offerings that are appropriate to one's income. The Old Testament people were guided by the Law of the Tithe. The first tenth of the produce of field and flock, the first and best, belonged to the Lord and was to be brought as offerings.

The Law of the tithe was imposed on God's people during a time of spiritual immaturity. The Old Testament people still had to look ahead to the

fulfillment of the covenant. Paul speaks to God's New Testament people. People who trust and follow the Fulfiller of the Covenant. He tells us we are freed from laws and now have personal responsibility to make a willing, mature, and appropriate decision regarding our Christian Giving.

The tithe is no longer a law for Christians. Many considerations enter into a decision as to what is appropriate for individuals or families in their situations. The standard of living imposed by our society may make 10% unrealistic for the income level and family circumstances of some. But neither is the tithe a ceiling for Christians. Affluent Christians may need to consider going beyond the tithe – some well beyond the tithe - properly to place God first in their finances. New Testament giving is to be "in proportion to our means," as 2 Corinthians 9:6-15 talks about.

2. Planning a pattern of giving that will implement the decision to honor Jesus with appropriate offerings - and faithfully carrying out that plan. Paul gave practical guidance to Gentile Christians who wanted to contribute to a fund to help their needy Jewish brothers and sisters during a drought and famine in Palestine. His words from 1 Corinthians 16:2 still offer us guidance today. Paul's words encourage giving that is: Systematic - "on the first day of the week" - or as you receive your income. Personal - "each one of you" – all are equipped by God to bring some gift to honor him. First-fruits - "set aside a sum of money" - the offering to

God is to be set aside as a first consideration in a Christian's management of money. This is faith-motivated and empowered giving. It deals in first-fruits, not leftovers. Proportionate – "in keeping with his income" – family income and family circumstances are significant factors in determining what is an appropriate offering. The worth of an offering may best be measured by what is left for one's own use and enjoyment, as we see from Luke 12:48b.

If our offerings are to be appropriate, we must think not only of the amount of money that we have but also about the lifestyle that we are pursuing. Our Lord's "You cannot serve both God and Money" applies also to a lifestyle that may be prompting us to serve Money, as Luke 12:13-21 states.

Therefore, I would like to challenge the congregation to tithe or at least to increase our giving. Giving is an important part of our worship of Christ. As I have stated above and in the letter that was sent out. Our giving gives our Lord honor and gratitude for who he is and what he has done.

For some of us, tithing is already a reality and, through God's grace, he may be setting a higher standard for us to achieve. For many others, the tithe will be a big leap forward and will be a big test of faith. Ephesians 3:20 promises us that our faith in God to enable our giving is well-placed, for he is able to do more than we can ask or imagine.

You see, it is faith that empowers us to give generously. What we do with our pocket

books is a reflection of the condition of our hearts. Our willingness to give is an indicator of where the priorities in our lives are. Tithing is a statement of faith. If our hearts are filled with the love of Christ, his love will be visible in what we do and give. As Christians today we are motivated for stewardship by the gift of God's grace through his Son. Our giving can have no greater foundation than the Gospel of forgiveness. I would like to stress that you please pray about what I have wrote here and let God lead you where he would like you to be when it comes to Christian Giving. May God be with us as we go about His Kingdom work with God's blessings.







# FISH Team Leader Responsibilities

Attending board meetings – The FISH board meets on the third Thursday of every month at 10:00 am at FISH. Meetings last about 30 minutes. There are no meetings in June, July and August.

Schedule volunteers – Churches work on a rotating schedule which turns out to be about 4 times a year for 1 week, 2 hours a day, 9:00-11:00am. It's hard to gauge how busy we're going to be so we try to have 4 people work each day. We stock shelves, bag groceries, and fill orders. If the team is not busy there is time to become well acquainted!

Working the counter – which fills one of the 4 volunteer positions and doing the paper work. It's nothing hard, you just tell the workers whether it's a single or a family and recording weight of the items. The volunteers gather groceries and weigh them.


Faith Lutheran has a great group of volunteers, and it runs like a well oiled machine.

# 'PREACH THE WORD' - Part 2

The sermon is the Gospel of Christ in present tense.

Part 1 of this article was featured in the October issue of Faith Alive.

### PINNACLE OF THE SERVICE OF THE WORD

The sermon, for Lutherans, must be vitally linked to the Word and to the creed. That is, the sermon is the proper exposition of the Gospel, and the Gospel is directly connected to the stated belief of the church through the ages. So normally, the sermon is placed either after the Gospel and the creed or between the Gospel and the creed. This placement is critical. The sermon is the pinnacle of the Service of the Word. It is the Word studied, explained and expounded through the vessel of the one called by the congregation to preach. The sermon is the Gospel in the present tense. It is, in that most proper sense, by the Spirit's power, a means of grace.

The sermon prepares and opens the hearer for the celebration of Holy Communion, the meal of forgiveness and fellowship that follows. Divine worship, then, becomes grace upon grace.

# DIVINE TREASURE IN EARTHEN VESSELS

Through the local congregation, the Church entrusts the public administration of the Office of the Keys to the pastor. That power or authority is always rooted and grounded in the cross of Christ. The preacher, in fact, is a triple-threat servant:

- 1. They are a servant of God and an ambassador of Jesus Christ. The message of the cross applies to the one who proclaims it, as a baptized child of God who is both sinner and saint at the same time.
- 2. They are a servant of God's Word. The sermon is an exposition of the Biblical text. The one who proclaims the Word must inhabit it, understand it, delve into it word by word to fathom "the depth of the riches of the wisdom and knowledge of God" (Rom. 11:33).
- 3. They are a servant of God's people. Their call is to and from a local assembly of believers, in all the diversity of their lives of faith. The specifics of the lives and times of God's people form the ground of experience around which, to which and over which the cross of Christ will be suspended.

# THE GOSPEL IN PRESENT TENSE

The distinction of Lutheran preaching lies in the radical claim that it is a "means of grace," that the power of the Gospel itself is available and is received through the Word of God proclaimed by the preacher. In the sermon the hearer is engaged in a living and personal encounter with the living God. Through Biblical texts, the sermon may contain humor and insight. It may be a call for moral courage; reveal penetrating direction for daily life, and speak to the most diverse and elevating issues of the day. The Lutheran difference is that all those levels of discourse on the Word are placed in the service of the cross of Christ. As Luther said, "All sermons in Christendom must refer and point to the one and only Christ." The cross of Christ is the central point of the history of the world. The preaching of the cross brings the very life of God to the hearts of hearers. By faith, that life of God in Christ is received now and forever. That is the Gospel in present tense. That is the power of the sermon in a Lutheran worship service!

### MAJOR OUTREACH PLANS IN DISCUSSION
