

# From Pastor's Heart

He is risen!! He is risen indeed, Alleluia! Boy doesn't that sound wonderful after having left behind the dark and dreary days of Holy Week and the five weeks of Lent! We are now in the festival season of Easter, which is the high point of the Church Year. We just celebrated Easter on April 20th, the day that the Lord rose from the dead. Having conquered sin and Satan, Jesus guarantees victory for us over death and the grave. Referring to the festival itself, Easter is the "queen of feasts." No preparation is too elaborate, and no observance is too jubilant when it comes to celebrating this time of the Church Year. The Easter Season is celebrated over fifty days or seven Sundays and includes two others Feasts: Ascension and Pentecost.

The color for Easter is white, symbolizing perfection, celebration, and joy. We will use the color white until Pentecost on June 8th when we will change to red, so please wear red on June 8th. More on that in next month's newsletter

During the Season of Easter we use the Paschal Candle, which has been placed down front, and represents that Jesus Christ was seen throughout the forty days until his ascension. Therefore, during the beginning of the Seventh Sunday of Easter we will blow out the light signifying that Jesus is no longer visible to us on the earth. Besides reminding us that Jesus made himself known throughout the forty days, the Paschal Candle also reminds us of Christ's victory over the darkness of sin and death. That is why we also use this candle during funerals and baptisms, representing the Light of Christ.

The Ascension of Our Lord is forty days after Easter, which always falls on a Thursday, this year on May 29, 2025. And seeing we do not have a service on that day, I will always try to alternate from year to year whether we have the Seventh Sunday of Easter or do the Ascension of Our Lord or a little bit of both.

Even though the Easter Season is only seven weeks long, each Sunday we come to this place to celebrate the risen Lord. For each Sunday is special in that regard. The first day of the week we come to celebrate the resurrection, the good news of the gospel that Jesus Christ is risen from the dead; for that is the good news we proclaim each Sunday. There is no other reason for us to gather together than the good news of the gospel that Jesus broke the bonds of death and gives to each one who believes in him the hope and the power of the resurrection.

But will this Easter make a difference? What's so important about Easter? Well, it's important because it proved that Jesus was who He claimed to be. Jesus is God in the flesh, and He came to earth to save us.

Three events occurred in a dramatic succession on that Easter weekend: the trial of Jesus, then the death of Jesus, and finally the resurrection of Jesus. Let's look at each of those events and their implications.

His Trial: Jesus actually went through six trials. In that one night, he was brought before Annas, Caiaphas (the high priest), the Sanhedrin (the religious Supreme Court), Pilate (the governor of Jerusalem), Herod (the governor of Galilee), and then back to Pilate. At the end of those six trials, what truth did they find to accuse him of? None. Jesus had done nothing wrong. They brought in people to make up phony charges, but those didn't stick. Finally, they convicted Him on one count: claiming to be the Son of God. That's the sole reason Jesus went to the cross. They didn't like that claim!

Everyone who has ever been presented with the truth about Jesus has already made some kind of decision about who He is. You either believe He's a liar, or you believe he's a lunatic, or you believe he's the Lord. It can't just be: "I believe he was a good teacher." He couldn't be just a good teacher because a good teacher wouldn't say, "I'm God, and I'm the only way to Heaven." A good person wouldn't say that unless it was the truth.

Jesus claimed to be the Savior of the world. In John 12:47b, He promised: "I did not come to judge the world but to save the world" (ESV). Jesus allowed Himself to be put on trial so there would be no doubt about who He was. He could have stopped the trial at any moment. He knew He would be proven guilty and put on the cross, but He allowed it to happen. It was all part of the divine plan.

His Death: After a night of beatings and mocking, after being crowned with painful thorns, Jesus was crucified. Crucifixion is probably the most brutal and torturous death penalty ever devised by men. His hands were stretched out wide against the cross and nailed through the two bones in each wrist. As the nails went through this part of the flesh, they would strike the nerve that travels up the arm and cause excruciating pain.

If you hung this way for any period of time, the muscles around your chest cavity began to be paralyzed. You'd be able to breathe in, but you couldn't breathe out. Death on a cross would have been a simple matter of suffocation, except the Romans didn't want to make it that easy. They'd take a person's knees and bend them a little bit and nail the feet to the cross. So, a man would hang there in absolute agony until the pain in his chest was about to explode and then he would lift himself up on his nailed feet to painfully grab a breath.

When the pain in his feet grew unbearable, he'd let himself back down again, until the pain in his lungs became unbearable. It was an incredibly torturous event. Eventually, the soldiers would break the legs of the criminal to hasten death by suffocation.

In the case of Jesus, they didn't have to break His legs because He had already died. But just to make sure, they stuck a spear in His side. Water and blood came out of the chest cavity, which,

doctors say, only happens if the heart rips. Why did Jesus have to die? Because He alone was able to pay for our sins. We deserved punishment, but Jesus paid the penalty. What happened is truly a miracle: For God made Christ, who never sinned, to be the offering for our sin, so that we could be made right with God through Christ (2 Corinthians 5:21).

His Resurrection: After Jesus died, they took His body down and put Him in the tomb, and a giant millstone was set in front of the cave. The religious leaders, worried that Jesus' body might be stolen, asked for Roman guards to be posted in front of the tomb. They didn't want Him coming out! But of course, He did.

You know the story. But it's important to remember that Easter is not some memorial to a nice, good religious teacher who lived 2,000 years ago. It's a celebration of the fact that He is alive today. I'm living proof, and so are the billions of Christians who celebrated Easter this year. He "was declared to be Son of God in power according to the spirit of holiness by his resurrection from the dead, Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 1:4 ESV).

Easter is the Good News about God's Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who came as a human baby, born into King David's royal family line. Four historical records say he showed himself to 500 people at one gathering. Can you imagine witnessing His death and then seeing Him walking around Jerusalem three days later?

What an amazing thing! When Jesus was hanging on the cross, the skeptics and critics mocked Him and in effect said, "If you're the Son of God, why don't you just pull yourself down from that cross? Why don't you just come down and show that you're really God?" Jesus had something more spectacular planned. He essentially said, "I'm going to let you bury Me for three days, then I'll come back to life to prove that I am what I am."

What does this mean to us today? In one sense, Jesus Christ is still on trial. He's on trial in the heart and mind of every person who has not yet acknowledged Him as the Son of God, the Savior of the world.

What's your verdict? You see, Easter really boils down to only two issues. One, is Jesus who He says He is? Is He God? Or is He a lunatic or a liar? And two, if He is who He says He is, when are you going to start fully following what He says to do with your life?

And so as you ponder that question, let's not forget that even though Easter Sunday is over and the candy has been taken off the store shelves, we come together each and every Sunday to celebrate the fact that He Is Risen!! He Is Risen Indeed, ALLELUIA!!! So don't be surprised if sometime during the summer or fall I might just try to catch you off guard, but of course I will not catch you off guard for the next few weeks. Let's have a joyous time as we celebrate the Resurrection of Our Lord.



# **'THE CHURCH YEAR'** The church calendar helps us remember and celebrate the life, death and resurrection of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Christians understand, that each day of the year is a gift from our gracious God. Indeed, for us it truly is the "year of our Lord." But another year has been adopted and used by the church. It is a powerful tool to assist Christians in remembering the life and times of their resurrected Lord as revealed in the Holy Scriptures. It is called the church year.

Used by Christians for centuries, the church-year calendar has evolved to provide daily and seasonal signposts of hope throughout the secular year for those who live in a world with change and decay. Not only does it help believers in Christ to live daily by faith, it can also aid them in fulfilling the Lord's great commission to "go and make disciples of all nations" (Matt. 28:18ff).

A LONG AND RICH HERITAGE

This historic calendar started with the early Christians. After the day of Pentecost, these brave and Spirit-filled people began to engage in a specific way of life and worship. St. Luke writes, "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer" (Acts 2:42); and, "Day after day, in the temple courts and from house to house, they never stopped teaching and proclaiming the good news that Jesus is the Christ" (Acts 5:42). Those early believers worshiped every day. One of the first Christian customs that arose, however, was to make the first day of the week, Sunday, "the Lord's Day" - even though these believers were coming out of the Jewish tradition of worship that emphasized Saturday (Sabbath) services. St. John (Rev. 1:10) uses the phrase "Lord's Day" to call

attention to this special day of the week which came to be used as a special day to commemorate the Lord's resurrection. This gave way to the tradition that each Sunday is a "little Easter".

#### USING THE CHURCH-YEAR CALENDAR

In the church year, the 52 weeks are separated into two parts: the festival half and the non-festival half. The first half of the church year contains "The Christmas Cycle" and "The Easter Cycle". The second half of the year includes "The Time of the Church".

The festival half elaborates on the life and ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ, beginning with His prophetic coming in the flesh and the events surrounding His birth. It emphasizes His baptism, the beginning of His three-year preaching ministry and His earthly suffering, death, resurrection and ascension into heaven.

The non-festival half celebrates Jesus' promise to send the Comforter, fulfilled when the Holy Spirit was revealed on Pentecost the 50th day following Christ's resurrection. This season emphasizes the action of that powerful Spirit working among Christ's people.

THE CHRISTMAS CYCLE Surrounding the birth of Jesus are the seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany.

Advent consists of a four-week period that precedes Christmas Day. Although the secular world is already celebrating, the churchyear calendar calls on Christians to use Advent as a time to prepare to celebrate the coming of our Lord at His birth. These days preceding Christmas focus on the Old Testament prophetic themes about the coming Messiah.

Christmas and the 11 days that follow celebrate the "Word

becoming flesh, making His dwelling among us" (John 1:14).

Epiphany (Greek for appearance or manifestation) begins its season with the celebration of the presentation of the gifts by the eastern magi—the gentiles. The appearance of these gentiles, foretold in the Old Testament (Is. 60:1ff), initiates a missionoutreach theme for the church of Bethlehem's babe.

The First Sunday after the Epiphany commemorates the Baptism of Jesus, which initiated His three-year preaching ministry. The season of Epiphany can last up to 8 weeks, depending on the date of Easter. The last Sunday after the Epiphany celebrates the transfiguration of Jesus (Matt. 17:1-9).

THE EASTER CYCLE

This holy season includes Lent, Holy Week and Easter. It begins with Ash Wednesday, the 7th Wednesday before Easter. Lent's focus of 40 days (not counting the six "little Easter" Sundays within the season), is on the theme of spiritual renewal, repentance and self reflection.

Palm Sunday, the day Jesus entered into Jerusalem on a colt, begins Holy Week. This sacred time calls every Christian to concentrate on the great suffering and sacrifice of their Lord. The Lenten season concludes with the final three days of Holy Week. The Triduum observe Christ's betrayal (Maundy Thursday), His suffering and death (Good Friday), and Saturday, used by some as the Easter Vigil—a day to watch and wait for Easter Day.

The date for each Easter Sunday is established as the first Sunday following the first full moon of the Spring equinox. Easter can be no earlier than March 22 and no later than April 25. It proclaims to the world the greatest victory that "Christ Jesus...has destroyed death and has brought life and immortality to light through the Gospel" (2 Tim. 1:10).

The church calendar reserves six Sundays as a time to commemorate the great event of Easter. On the 40th day, the church celebrates Jesus' ascension into heaven.

THE TIME OF THE CHURCH On the 50th day following Easter Sunday, God's people remember the great day of Pentecost, sometimes referred to as the "birthday of the church." Ten days following Christ's ascension, the promised Holy Spirit was revealed to the 11 disciples in Jerusalem (Acts 2:1).

The day of Pentecost initiates the non-festival half of the church year, which can last up to 28 Sundays concluding with the last Sunday in the church year, also known as Christ the King Sunday. The First Sunday after Pentecost is observed as Holy Trinity Sunday.

What would the year be without a calendar? For each day, week, month and year on this earth, we can live with a sense of confidence and hope. The church-year calendar can be a helpful tool to remember the life and times of the Risen Lord Jesus Christ as time "flies by".

on the lawn. It made it so festive and gave us places to hide the eggs. Thank you all again.


VBS "True North – Trusting Jesus in a Wild


